

Robersonville Red Cross Chapter Goes Over Top In Drive

Final Report Shows That A Total of \$1,742.63 Was Raised In Chapter

Mr. Mayo Little, chairman of the recent Red Cross fund drive in the territory embraced by the Robersonville Chapter, made a complete and final report this week. Purchased last September the Robersonville Ice and Coal Company expects to install soon a Joltrite cement block maker. This new machine makes cement blocks by power and automatically. According to Mr. C. M. Hurst, who witnessed the operation of the machine before it was purchased, the Joltrite will make 300 blocks each day and they are guaranteed to be uniform and every block has the same amount of ingredients.

Part of the machinery has already arrived and the owner and operator expects to begin operating the new plant on a fairly large scale within a short time. Mr. Hurst is now making well tile, heavy duty, which may be used in large ditches or under bridges. The Robersonville Ice and Coal Company has had 15 years experience in making tile and cement blocks and with the arrival of the new machine the owners expect to expand their business and serve a large section of eastern Carolina.

New Way To Take Oxygen From Air

The New York Times reports the disclosure by Dr. Melvin Calvin, University of California scientist, of a new and greatly simplified method of obtaining oxygen from the air for industrial use, one of the hitherto undisclosed wartime achievements of American scientists. The process works, it was stated, on the same principle as that by which the human body takes oxygen from the air and into the blood. Air is blown through a tube which is lined by a specially compounded red-colored chemical. This chemical absorbs oxygen. When the absorption reaches its maximum, the air flow is stopped and the chemical gives off its oxygen when the tube is heated. The oxygen is pumped into storage tanks and the process is repeated again and again. Dr. Calvin said the method was used to supply oxygen for welding and other operations in the South Pacific

where regular base supplies were not available. The method was conceived while researchers were looking for something to indicate oxygen changes in submarines. He submitted the idea to the National Defense Research Committee which financed further studies.

Dr. I. O. Schaub, Extension director at State College, who "remembers when," says that post-war conditions now sharply parallel those existing in 1919.

World of Material In Foreign Lands

The United States Army still has scattered over Europe and the Pacific something fewer than 16,000 planes, "several thousand" tanks, and acres of shells, among other munitions left over from the war, according to a Washington report. U. S. materials overseas are estimated at \$15,000,000,000. How much of this vast stockpile will be abandoned or hauled out to sea and dumped probably will be determined, the War department said, after the world inspection tour headed by Under Secretary K. C. Royall.

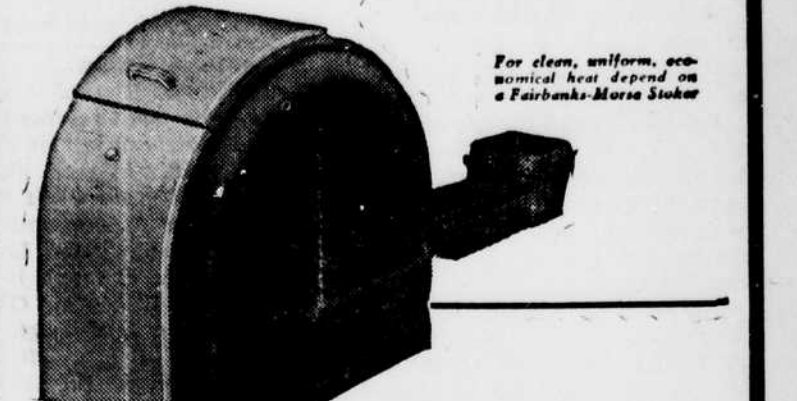

S. 64, across U. S. 64 along the line between the Lanier Land and the W. A. Roberson Land to Big Pond; thence down Big Pond Branch to Peters Swamp; thence down Peters Swamp to the River; thence up Roanoke River to the mouth of Conoho Creek.
