again. "I feel sorry for you," Judge Smith said.

Entering no plea in the case charging him with violating the public health law as it acts to control the spread of tuberculosis, Joseph L. Godard was adjudged guilty and was sentenced to the roads for six months. The road term was suspended on condition that the defendant enter the Martin County Sanatorium on June 3 and remain there until released by the superintendent of public welfare and the health department.

Pleading guilty in the case charging him with larceny and false pretense, Willie Biggs was sentenced to the roads for four months.

Clifton Forbes, Jr., charged with operating a motor vehicle without a driver's license, pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and required to pay the costs. The court recommended that no license be issued the defendant for one year.

Bill Brown, colored, was fined \$25 and taxed with the costs in the case charging him with assaulting a female. The prosecuting witness, his wife, said in open court that they had come to a parting of the ways. Brown, a veteran of nearly four years in the service, has been out of the army hardly four months.

In the case charging the violating the liquor laws, Gosard pleaded not guilty, but Medlar pleaded guilty of selling illegal liquor. Medlar was fined \$50 and required to pay costs.
