Recently the National Association of Manufacturers, in one of its kept press sheets, had the gall to say, "The restoration of competition, with the permanent abolition of OPA, will bring full production and the prosperity which everyone has been hoping for."

After ignoring the facts as they existed, the organization blurs its vision looking toward the future. In working for the death of OPA, the NAM did not stop to think that inflation would set in, that workers would act to get wages commensurate with rising living costs, that production would be interrupted, that the nation is almost certain to get caught in a vicious circle wherein it can run faster to wreck and ruin.

When members of the supposedly august United States Supreme Court go to the public square to wash their dirty linen, when Congress talks of shady transactions of its members and wrangles over and muddles important legislation is there any wonder that there are jurisdictional disputes among common workers and that the individual is confused.

When the recognized leadership falters and dimly fails to lead we can expect little more than confusion throughout the length and breadth of the land.

News As Reported In The Enterprise Forty Years Ago

JULY 27, 1906

Wednesday morning at the residence of the bride's mother, Mrs. Hannah C. Ray, the marriage of Miss Esbe Benjamin Ray to Mr. William Matthew Wilson took place, the Rev. B. D. Carroll officiating.

The parlor, in which the ceremony was performed, was tastefully decorated in green and white. The bride, who entered to the music of Mendelssohn, played by Miss Carrie A. Biggs, was dressed in the following: Misses Della Ray and Lettie Critcher who wore gowns of white and carried La France roses, followed by Miss Mattie Lou Anderson, who brought in the wedding rings, immediately followed by the bride and groom. Miss Ray wore a chic gown of gray and carried a shower bouquet of bride's roses. After the ceremony the party was driven to the station, where they took the train for a tour of northern states.

The board of town commissioners met Tuesday evening in regular session and the most important matter acted upon was a movement for a more systematic work of improving the streets. The following resolution was adopted:

"That the town be divided into five wards and one commissioner be assigned to each ward as street commissioner of said ward, viz: The Eastern Ward to include all streets east of Main street up to and including Smithwick street, the new road and R. R. street in front of T. J. Latham's.

The Southern Ward to include all streets south of Main Street, commencing with Hassell street thence to the boundary line.

The Central ward to include Main Street from the river to the railroad.

The Western ward to include all streets west of Main down to and including Haughton street.

The different wards were assigned as follows to commissioners: Eastern Ward, W. A. Ellison; Southern Ward, C. H. Godwin; Central Ward, N. S. Pool; Western Ward, A. Anderson; Northern Ward, J. D. Leggett.

- Enlistments for 1 1/2, 2 or 3 years. (One-year enlistments permitted for men now in the Army with 6 or more months of service.)
- Enlistment age from 18 to 34 years inclusive (17 with parents' consent) except for men now in Army, who may reenlist at any age, and former service men depending on length of service.
- A reenlistment bonus of \$50 for each year of active service since such bonus was last paid, or since last entry into service, provided reenlistment is within 90 days after last honorable discharge.
- Up to 90 days' reenlistment furlough with pay, depending on length of service, with prescribed travel allowance paid to home and return, for men now in the Army who reenlist.
- Consult your Army Recruiting Officer for other furlough privileges.
- Mustering-out pay (based upon length of service) to all men who are discharged to enlist or reenlist.
- Option to retire at half pay for the rest of your life after 20 years' service—increasing to three-quarters pay after 30 years' service. (Retirement income in grade of Master or First Sergeant up to \$185.63 per month for life.) All previous active federal military service counts toward retirement.
- Benefits under the GI Bill of Rights assured for men who enlist on or before October 5, 1946.
- Choice of branch of service and overseas theater (of those still open) on 3-year enlistments.
