

Sixteen Criminal Cases Slated For Trial Next Week

en was placed under \$1,000 bond. Richard Davis, Poplar Point white man, is charged with assaulting Floyd Thomas with an automobile near Williamston on Highway 64 the 21st day of last month, resulting in the child's death. Davis was released under bond in the sum of \$750.

Frank Green, Jamesville colored man, is charged with drunken and reckless driving and manslaughter. Driving a truck, Green ran into a car operated by W. A. Bailey at the intersection of Highway 17 and the Bear Grass Road on January 18, causing the death of James Garland Bailey and the injury of W. A. Bailey. Roland Harrison, Vernon Harrison and Johnnie Wynne. He was released under bond.

and Lester Saunders, three young colored men, are to answer in the case charging them with assaulting James L. Bond and William H. Harrell, poultry dealers, in Robersonville on the evening of February 8. Bond was nearly killed when he was stabbed in the heart. Undergoing treatment in a Durham hospital, the young man, a former resident of Williamston who is now living in Bertie County, is getting along very well and the case was placed on the trial docket this week. Two of the defendants, unable to raise bond, continue in jail. Attorneys Clifton Everett and Peel and Manning have been employed to assist Solicitor George Fountain in the prosecution.

Charged with obtaining \$527 by false pretense from R. S. Critcher back in July, 1945, John E. Williams is again scheduled for trial, the case having been continued each term since September, 1945.

Henry L. Harvey, charged with drunken driving, is booked for trial after having had his case continued at each term of the court since December, 1945.

Willie Savage, his case having been continued at least twice, is scheduled to answer in the case charging him with obtaining \$60 from Dr. E. L. Early by false pretense.

Ethel Dell Dail and David O. Bowen, charged with fornication and adultery during certain periods last year, appealed from a county court judgment and failed to report for trial last December.

Richard Vines, charged with

breaking into and stealing \$180 and four quarts of legal liquor from the Roberson Slaughter House last October 4, is slated for trial next Monday after having had his case continued last term.

Appealing from a county court judgment, Leonard Boston is to answer to the charge of trespassing on the lands of Joe Jefferson and assaulting Jefferson.

John H. Smith, appealing from a county court judgment, is charged with issuing three worthless checks, one in the sum of \$15, another in the sum of \$75 and a third in the sum of \$15 last January to W. H. Manning of Bethel.

Jim Johnson, Oak City white man, and Ruth Davis, colored woman, are charged with fornication and adultery, indecent exposure and drunkenness and disorderly conduct, appealed from 90-days sentence meted out by Judge J. C. Smith in the county court.

Going on a rampage last December 14, Tom Scott is charged with entering the home of Charlie Mason and assaulting Mason and Annie Clyde Davis.

Whit M. Donald and John Earl Edmonds, young white men, are charged with entering the home of Lester Rogers last January and carrying off three watches, \$7 in cash and a pint of liquor.

LeRoy Patterson is charged with bastardy, the warrant alleging that "he begot upon the body of Kati Griffin a child on March 22, 1946, and refuses to support said child." In the county court Patterson called for a jury trial and the case was scheduled for trial next week.

Glenn Albert Chase, former serviceman from Iowa and until his arrest a short time ago a farmer near Williamston, is charged with breaking into and robbing the Woolard Hardware and Pittman stores here on February 25. Unable to raise bond in the sum of \$1,750, he continues in jail.

Edward Griffin, J. E. Purvis and Lawrence Wiggins are charged with the larceny on or about last December 17 of 14 bags of peanuts valued at \$140 from Gurganus and Rogers here.

SUGAR

Individual consumers will be allotted ten pounds of sugar the first of next month, the amount to last until July 1. The allotment will be issued against stamp No. 11 which will be good until September 30. Another ten pounds will be allotted in July, providing sugar imports meet expectations.

The current sugar ration stamp, No. 53, expires the last of this month.

While the future supply of sugar is certain to pass the demand, a surplus is not expected before the latter part of this or early next year. Another ten-pound allotment is promised in September, boosting the total for the year to 35 pounds per person.

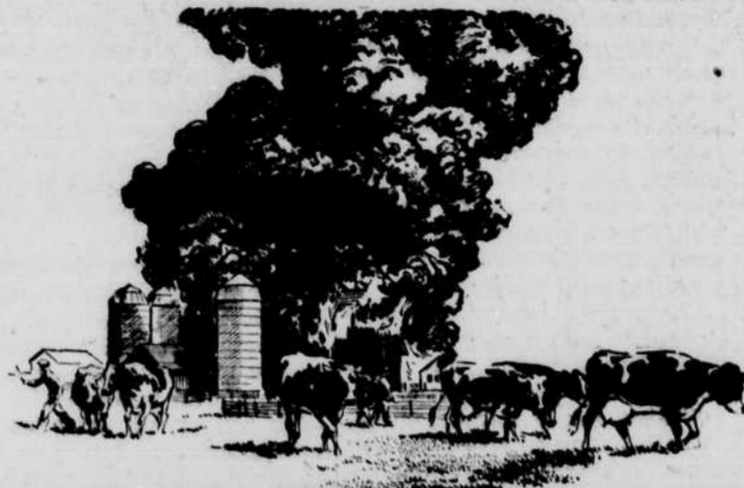

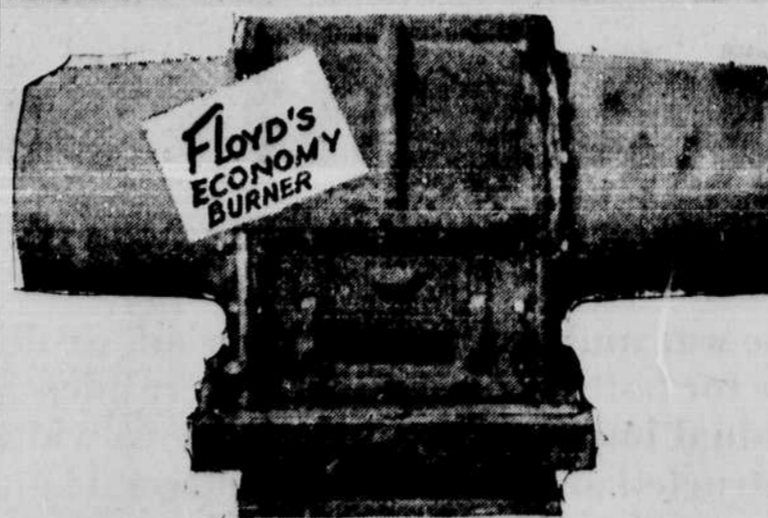

Over A Million Off The Payroll

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced a reduction of almost a million and a half federal employes in a year and a half, from 3,770,000 at the

war-time peak on June 30, 1945, to 2,277,000 at the end of 1946. These figures included employes both at home and abroad. Employes in the United States dropped by 935,000, falling below the 2,000,000 mark at the year's end for the first time in the post-war period. The December 31 total was 1,980,475. Full-time employment of women in the United States has dropped from 1,078,883 on June 30, 1945, to 497,719. Women's employment was still decreasing faster than men's at the year's end, the December decline for women being 18,529 and for men, 16,107 in December.

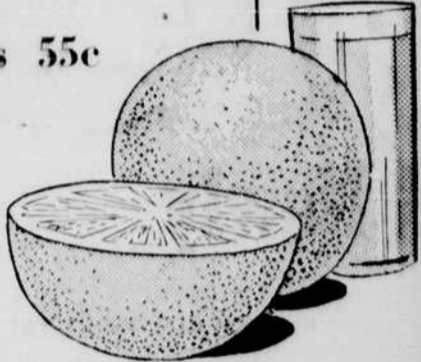
