We cannot understand Russia's censorship. But do we try to understand it? Do we want to understand it? Russia has lifted its censorship on several occasions, but it was slapped back. One reason why Russia has a censorship was explained by Joe Stalin to Harold E. Stassen at a recent conference with the Minnesota man. Stalin, according to Mr. Stassen said,

"It will be difficult in our country to dispense with censorship. Mr. Molotov tried to do it several times. We had to resume it. and each time we repented it. In the autuma of 1945, censorship was repealed. I was on leave, and they started to write stories that Mr. Molotov had forced me to go on leave and then wrote stories that I should return and fire him. These stories depicted the Soviet Government as a sort of zoological garden. Of course, our people got angry, and they had to resume censor-


