Planned Economy Scores

The Washington bureaucrats have been belittled, criticized, condemned, ridiculed and mocked, but they scored a victory recently when Maryland tobacco farmers called to Washington for help.

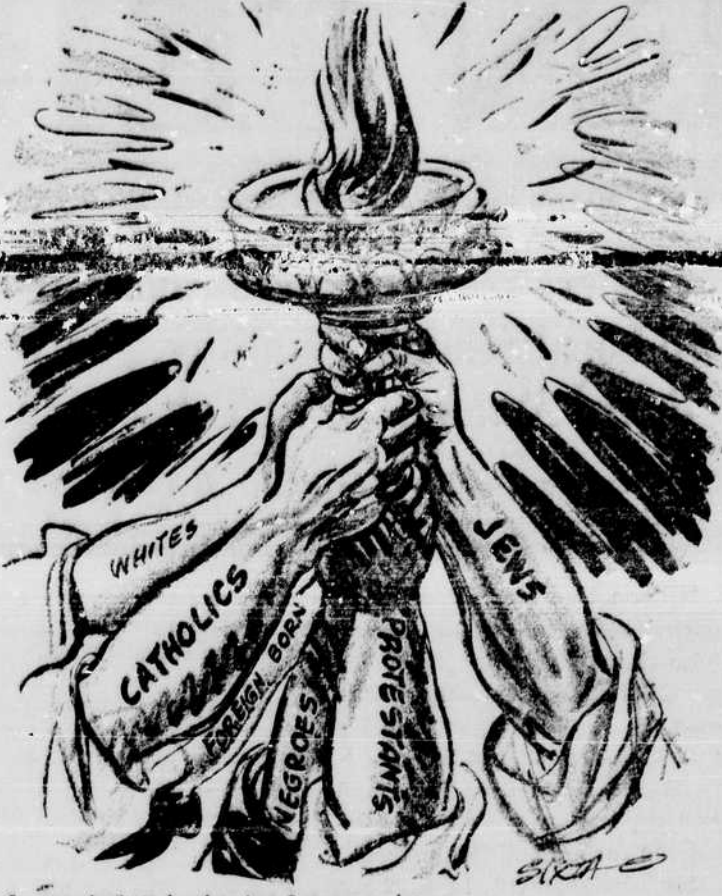
Umstead made his position crystal clear when he said, "The vote speaks for itself." Hoey was not so specific on this point when he was approached.
