We think nothing of it, but it must be puzzling to the hungry fellow in Bulgaria or some other Balkan country when, America continues to buy gold to add to its bulging stock. They dig it up in South Africa; we pay about \$35 an ounce for it, and then bring it to this country and bury it. The Balkan native wonders why the gold isn't left in the ground in the first place? And when Bevins comes along and suggests that the gold be used to help save the world situation we laugh at him and our Balkan friend becomes more puzzled.

A large reduction in peanut acreage is demandatory for this section next year. We are going to decrease the plantings of the food crop when millions are starving. There is little wonder that the Balkan peoples when they are appraised of such antics are






