North Carolinians will determine the fate of a \$200,000,000 road bond issue at the polls on Saturday, June 4. Already a selfish opposition is developing while most of the people in this county express little interest one way or the other.

Too many are branding the program as nothing more than a spending spree. We had rather recognize the program as being an investment, for when a dollar is invested in the name of a fellow citizen it is not by any means thrown away. And those who live on the hardsurfaced highways and paved street should remember that thousands are not so fortunate, that they, too, would like to share in more of the advantages. It is unholy for anyone who lives on a surfaced highway to deny a similar opportunity to the fellow living now on a muddy road. Let's be fair toward our fellowman and go forward together.

It is true that the program will cost much, but when we compare the amount we are spending for questionable things with the amount our leaders propose to invest in a road program for North Carolina, we can meet the cost. There were those who opposed Cameron Morrison's bond issue thirty years ago, but that program paid off many times, and the current program can and will do the same if the people will approve it on June 4.

We are spending billions for war. Let us here in North Carolina invest in and remember the forgotten man.

Is There A Danger In Leisure?

For years we have worked toward changing our economy to enable everyone to have more leisure. Adherents of the shorter work week, the shorter work day, found their greatest appeal in that these would furnish more leisure. Thumb over any magazine. The advertisements blazon forth more leisure time as the greatest boon their products can bring. The idea in itself is excellent—if that leisure be wisely used—but, nevertheless, there is an incipient danger therein.

What is leisure? The dictionary definition is first, "freedom from necessary occupation," but there is a second definition, "time available for some particular purpose"—and there is where the catch lies.

The totalitarian states organized leisure into a form of training. Every recreational activity was bent toward that one end. Men, women and children were regimented for one purpose—conquest—if not by undercover activities and boring from within, then from war. The democracies made a god of leisure—and we have but to look at the map of Europe to see the results.

Surely there is some happy medium. Some way in which leisure may be made to follow its second definition without losing sight of the first.

Leisure may follow this middle way if the individual—the prime factor in a democracy—will so apply his leisure that it works both for his advantage and for the good of all.

What does this mean? It means first using leisure to get physically and mentally fit. It means leisure to study, so that we may know more about the things that affect our daily lives, so that we may have understanding as we gain wisdom. It means leisure to know people, that we may learn how to work, as well as play, together. It means leisure to do things for others, not for what we may get, but for what we may give.

If we turn our leisure into these channels, we can prove the worth of the great principle of individual liberty of act and conscience upon which our nation rests. We need then have no fear that the regimentation of all the people will come upon us from without or from within, for we will have demonstrated that the individual is not just a machine, but a thinking person, capable of assuming all the rights and the responsibilities that go with citizenship in a democracy.

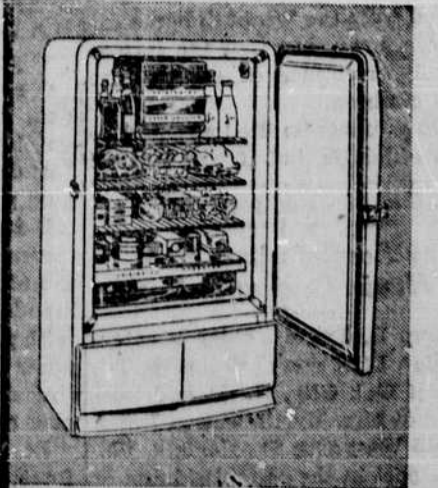

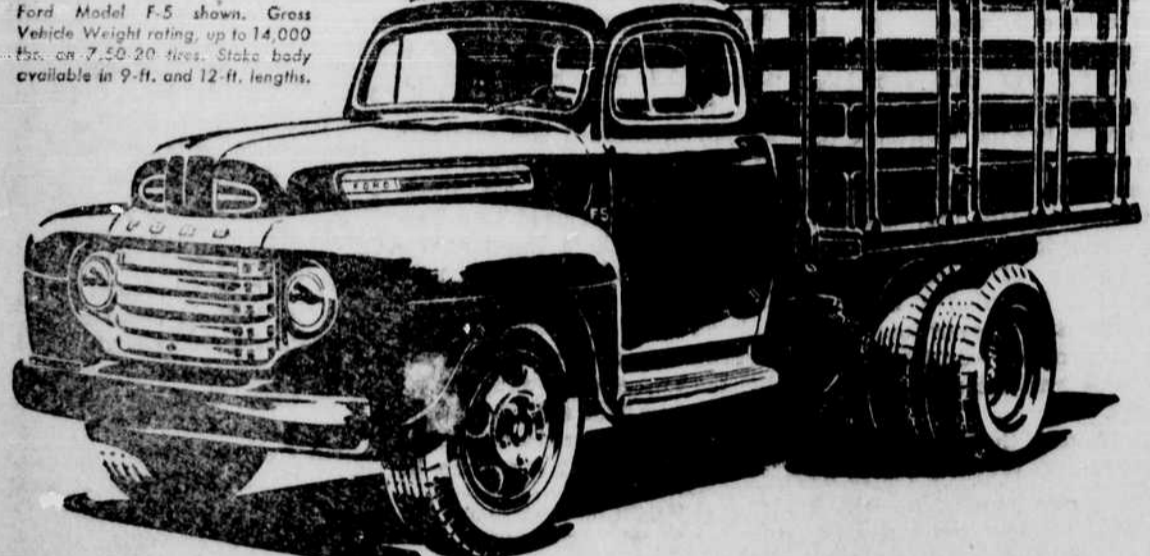
