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Walter Salsbury **Died In Hospital** Sunday Morning

Funeral In Hamilton Monday Afternoon For Retired Business Man

Robert Walter Salsbury, retired business man-farmer, died in a Tarboro hospital Christmas morning after a long period of declining health. His condition had been serious for several weeks.

The son of the late Robert Hyman and Laura Purvis Salsbury, he was born in Hassell 77 years ago, and spent his early life on the farm, later engaging in the mercantile business there and in Hamilton where he made his home for a number of years. He was also engaged in business at Williamston for some time, handling fertilizer accounts and buying farm products. He retired about two years ago on account of declining health.

His wife, the former Miss Bettie Davis of Tarboro, died in September, 1948.

Surviving are two brothers, Paul L. Salsbury, Scotland Neck, Robert H. Salsbury, Hassell; five sisters, Mrs. W. A. Ayers, Clinton, Mrs. W. Z. Morton, Greenville, Mrs. Paul Edmondson, Hassell, Mrs. Julia Cherry and Miss Louise Selsbury, Tarboro.


