The first grade rhythm band, organized in January and directed by the first grade teachers, will make its first public appearance. They will be well worth hearing.

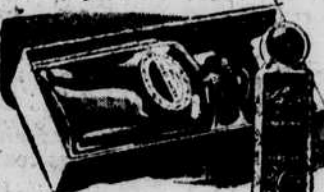

Three hundred dollars of the cost of the vestments have been raised but a balance of one hundred dollars is still needed.

For the past two years the public has been invited to the spring festival without cost. However, this year it will be necessary to make a small charge to take care of the balance due on the vestments, and expense of special music. The public school music department is financed through programs given by the children as no other money is available.

The price of admission will be 20 cents for children and 35 cents for adults. Come and hear the three glee clubs, a girls' trio, mixed quartet, male quartet, as well as choruses from the different grades.
