Security But Not Socialistic!

The American Telephone and Telegraph Company, one of the world's great holding companies, had a long meeting the other day. The business, for the most part was cut and dried.

When one of the little stockholders suggested that pensions for ranking company officials be limited to \$25,000 a year, he was "hooted" down. Another little guy proposed that pensions be paid for partly by the company officials sharing in the provisions of the system. He, too, was shouted down. Another one of the little fellows suggested that salaries in the hundred thousand class be reduced in any year the company failed to pay the "traditional" \$9 a share dividend, but his cry was lost in the wilderness.

The big boys really walked off with the melon and got security. And no one branded their action as being socialistic.




