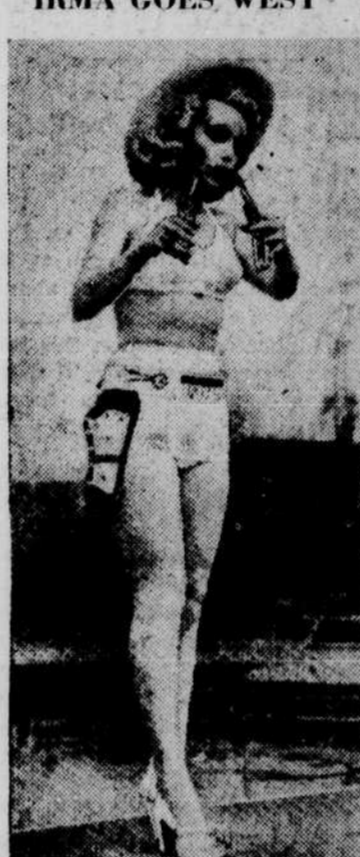
Here From High Point
