fine and costs. Appeal to the high-
er court was noted and \$250 bond
was required.

Dennis Jones pleaded guilty of
operating a motor vehicle with-
out a driver's license and was
fined \$25 plus costs.

Pleading guilty of violating the
liquor laws, Frank Brown was
sentenced to the roads for three
months, the court suspending the
term upon the payment of a \$50
fine and costs.

Jesse Baker, pleading guilty,
was fined \$50 and taxed with
the costs for violating the liquor
laws. A 60-day road sentence was
suspended.
