CEREMONY HELD IN THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH HERE SUNDAY

On Sunday afternoon, July 16, 1950, at 5 o'clock in the Williams-ton Christian Church, in a simple but dignified ceremony, Miss Dorothy Britton Manning became the bride of George William Shoe. Reverend John L. Goff, pastor of the church, officiated, using the impressive double-ring service.

The church was beautifully decorated with tall floor standards of white gladioli and fern and seven-branched candelabra holding lighted cathedral tapers. Family pews were marked with white asters and stephanotis caught with white satin ribbon.

Prior to the ceremony a program of nuptial music was rendered by Mrs. W. C. Manning, Jr., organist, and Mrs. Moye Dail of Greenville, soloist. Mrs. Dail sang "All For You" and "Entreat Me Not To Leave Thee." The traditional bridal chorus from Lohengrin was used for the processional and Mendelssohn's wedding march for the recessional. During the ceremony "O Perfect Love" was softly played and Mrs. Dail sang "The Lord's Prayer" as a benediction.

The ushers were Dr. Kenneth Quiggins, Mr. Allen Powell of Greenville, Mr. Vernon Cox of Winterville, and Mr. Jos. W. Griffin, brother-in-law of the bride, of Williamston.

Attending her sister as matron of honor was Mrs. Jos. W. Griffin, who wore a dress of orchid lace and chiffon and a matching picture hat. Her crescent, arm bouquet was of yellow carnations and stephanotis tied with yellow ribbon.

The bride entered on the arm of her cousin, Mr. James C. Manning, and was given in marriage by her mother. The groom had as his best man, Mr. Milton Adams of Wilson. Miss Ruth Manning of Williamston presided at the door as mistress of ceremonies.

The bride wore an original dress of Chantilly type lace fashioned with a portrait neckline, a full skirt and a wide circular train. Her veil of imported illusion fell from a halo of lace. Her only ornament was a diamond pendant, gift of the groom.
