### Eggs Should Not Be Left Out Too Long

Eggs should be held at a temperature between 50 and 60 degrees Fahrenheit, with a relative humidity of about 75 percent. At 69 degrees fertile eggs start germinating, and between 70 and 100 degrees eggs quickly lose their taste and flavor. There is a tendency for the whites to become watery and the yolks to flatten out. The eggs assume the characteristics of staleness, which the purchaser will resent.

R. S. Dearstyne, head of the poultry department at State College, says the problem of the producer is to retain the quality of freshly laid eggs for as long a period of time as possible. To establish this objective, the poultryman must collect eggs frequently during the day, cool them as rapidly as possible, and store them under good conditions.
