Chinese Reds Act In Own Interests

Tucson, Ariz.—Admiral Chester N. Nimitz says the Chinese Reds have used the Korean war as an excuse to move troops into Manchuria for protection from Russia. The admiral estimated Mao Tse-tung, China's Red leader, has between 300,000 and 500,000 troops now in Manchuria. He said he is convinced the troops are there to protect Manchuria from the Russians and to secure China's share of Yalu River hydro-electric power.

"Manchuria," he said is an interview last night, "is as important to China as the Ruhr is to Europe. It is the one place in Asia where there is a combination of coal and iron ore for steel making. "Mao knows that if the lot of the Chinese people is to be improved, Manchuria's production is indispensable. The Russians would like to see a good portion of that production flowing toward the Soviet Union."
