

Big Annual Hunt Held by Rainbow Club Last Week

Hunters From a Number of States Participated In The Event

The members and guests gathered at Rainbow Gun Club, Sunday afternoon, Nov. 19, 1950 for their annual Thanksgiving hunt. This club is located in Bertie County

on the Roanoke River about one mile from Hamilton, N. C. As usual the men left the club house early Monday morning for their first day's hunt. Four deer were killed. The men killing these were Dr. J. R. Hester, Wendell, N. C., D. F. Holliday, Henderson, N. C., Richard Barnhill, Stokes, N. C. and C. B. Corey, Portsmouth, Va.

After the evening meal, several of the men went coon hunting. Due to the weather - such as high wind and dry leaves, only four coons were treed. The highlight of this hunt was not the treeing of coons but the rich experiences of Dr. E. A. Trinkle, Weston, Va. This was his first coon hunt. New paths on this veteran hunting

ground as well as trees that would not support a weary hunter were found by Dr. Trinkle. On one of his falls, the wick was lost out of his lantern. This has never been known to happen before among coon hunters. After 30 minutes or more searching for the wick, it was finally found and the hunt continued.

After a snoring good time Monday night, the men awakened with renewed vim, vigor and vitality. On this day's deer hunt only two deer were killed. Albert Jarvis, Weston, W. Va. and J. R. Winslow, Robersonville, N. C. were the victors.

On this night Dr. Jefferson Browder and Dr. Ford Warren of Brooklyn, N. Y. entertained the men with a crow call and shoot at the oyster bar in Williamston, N. C.

On Wednesday, most of the men rested for the big hunt Thanksgiving Day. Although a few went squirrel hunting, including Art Ward, Weston, W. Va. who killed 7 that day.

The annual business meeting of the club was held this night and the following officers elected: J. R. Winslow, Robersonville, N. C. President; C. T. Smith, Robersonville, N. C. Secretary and Treasurer; C. L. Keel, Robersonville, N. C. Chrm. House Com.; George Stevenson, Hobgood, N. C. Chrm. Warden Com.

Thursday morning the men started off with a bang! Six men left to try their skill at turkey hunting. The remainder went deer hunting. Three turkeys and four deer were bagged. The victorious turkey hunters were C. B. Corey, Portsmouth, Va., T. G. Savage Hobgood, N. C. and C. A.

That evening when all the hunters came in and a most delectable supper was served. This consisted of turkey, corn, venison and all the trimmings. Approximately 75 were served.

At 9 o'clock that evening, Art Ward, Weston, W. Va., Judge of the Kangaroo Court, and J. R. Winslow, Robersonville, N. C., Prosecuting Attorney, called this fair and just court to order to try members and guests who had missed a deer since the last annual hunt. The following men tried to defend their shirt tails:

Z. V. Long, Tarboro, N. C. tried and convicted; penalty 2 inches of his shirt tail.

L. Roy Clark, Wendell, N. C., tried and convicted; penalty, 2 inches of his shirt tail.

Herbert Highsmith, Robersonville, N. C., case continued from last hunt. Due to lack of sufficient evidence, case was dismissed.

C. B. Corey, Portsmouth, Va., tried and convicted; penalty, 2 inches of his shirt tail.

C. L. Keel, Jr., tried and convicted, but being a minor, was put on probation for 3 years under his father's care.

New evidence was presented at this time in the case of Herbert Highsmith and his case was reopened. He was tried and convicted. The Judge ordered 2 inches of shirt tail cut from the front and two inches cut from the rear for "lying" twice.

Court then adjourned. Special awards were then given by Albert Jarvis, Weston, W. Va. and Art Ward, Weston, W. Va.

2nd To J. R. Winslow, Robersonville, N. C. a like prize was awarded for Tuesday's kill.

3rd To John Long, Tarboro, N. C. a like prize was awarded for Thursday's kill.

4th A grand prize, a 7 piece cocktail set to Dr. J. R. Hester, Wendell, N. C. for killing the largest deer with the most points.

5th A cocktail set to T. S. Savage, Hobgood, N. C. for killing the largest turkey.

The final prize was a 72 oz. ice tea glass with the inscription "Bet You Can't" and filled with iced tea. This was awarded Wiley B. Rogerson, Robersonville, N. C. for being the "snoringest" member of Rainbow Gun Club.

The majority of men left after this but a few stayed to try their skill Friday, turkey hunting. After sitting for several hours in the turkey blind, the turkey saw Art Ward's red shirt first.

Art went Bang! Bang! Bang! but no luck. J. R. Winslow banged away too, but no luck for him either.

This day brought to an end a most successful hunt. The men said their goodbye's with "I'll see you next year, and better luck to you Mr. Trinkle, no cat on new trails."
