When the South is accused of "signs of poverty and unhappiness," it is easy to retort (as Debnam does) that there is plenty of unhappiness and poverty in the North, East and West. Nothing could be more true, unfortunately, and nothing could do the South more harm than to seek consolation for its own deficiencies by supinely contemplating those of other sections. That is not the way the South has made the amazing progress it has made particularly in the past 50 years.

Mrs. Roosevelt as a critic of the South is often misguided and wrong, we think, but fundamentally sympathetic and desirous of being helpful.

The South is strong and great enough to take. It no longer runs its Walter Hines Pages out of the country. It builds on the land its critics have cleared.
