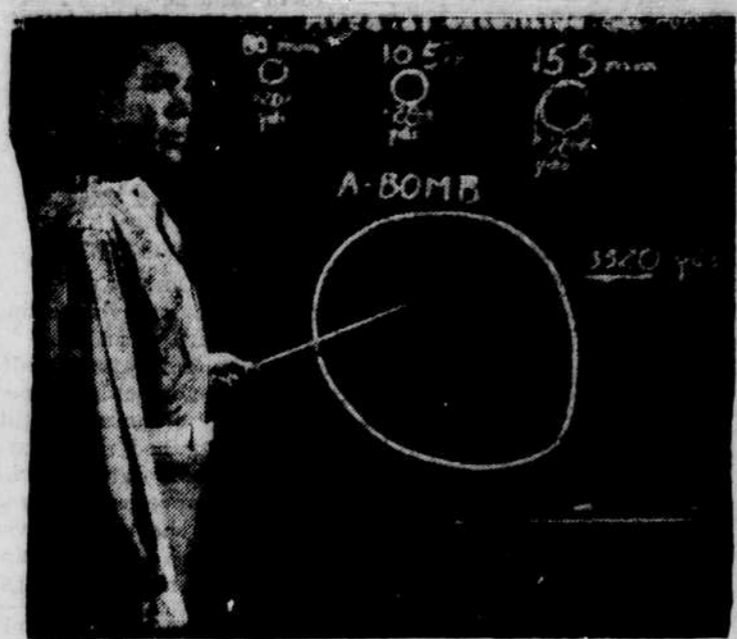

December 7, 1950, for furnishing all labor, equipment and materials for performing all work for clearing rights of way and excavating and cleaning out drainage canals in Bear Grass, Turkey Cock, Bee Tree Swamps and laterals thereto which are located principally in Bear Grass Township, Martin County, North Carolina and within the boundaries of Martin County Drainage District No. One.
