WHITE NYLON

When white nylon turns yellow or brown, the discoloration, is there to stay and cannot be removed. It can be prevented, however. Never launder white nylon at temperatures above 270 degrees F.

Nylon, because it is a strong fabric, is often abused. It should be handled carefully just as you would handle any rayon or silk garment. Because nylon picks up colors very rapidly, it should never be washed with colored pieces.

Wrinkling makes a nylon difficult to iron. In automatic washers set the extractor at full speed and shut off immediately. This will reduce some of the wrinkling.

The best way to laundry-mark nylon is to use marking tape. This can be applied to the garment. Marking solutions contain materials that are usually harmful to nylon fibers.
