Advised To Enter Sanatoria

By John W. Williams, Martin County Health Officer

Now that the TB survey has been completed in Martin County we can give details of the first and only 100 percent survey the State has ever had. By the 100 percent we mean that out of 10,-952 persons X-rayed, 286 were requested to come to the Health Department or the family physician everyone of them did so. Out of this number some had to be followed up with further study such as the skin test for tuberculosis. an examination of the sputum for the germ, etc. This was a tremendous amount of work as each case required two or three visits before a diagnosis was established.
