Gradually Being Undermined

Only a few have come out to boldly oppose it, but the farm program is gradually being undermined by the reactionaries, including several in the Democratic ranks close home.

The irish potato program has been discarded, and as a result growers have received comparatively little while consumers in a single year were forced to pay many millions of dollars in excess of the cost when the program was in effect.
