

Miss Marilyn Winifred Fussell Weds Louis Jerome Norris, Jr., June 29th

CEREMONY HELD IN THE THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH HERE

In a five o'clock candlelight ceremony in the First Presbyterian Church of Williamston on June 29, Miss Marilyn Winifred Fussell pledged her marriage vows with Louis Jerome Norris, Jr. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Fussell of Williamston and the groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Norris, Sr., of Morehead City.

Reverend J. Don Skinner, pastor of the bride and Dr. John Bunn, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Morehead City officiated to perform the double ring ceremony. The vows were exchanged before a setting of white gladioli arrangements with white candles set against a background of fern and smilax.

Prior to the entrance of the bridal party a half hour program of nuptial music was rendered by Miss Jean Mobley of Williamston. Miss Mobley played a prelude of wedding selections and Mrs. Josiah Bailey, Jr., of Raleigh sang "Beloved Is This Morn". At the approach of the wedding party, Miss Mobley played Lohengrin's "Bridal March" continuing with "Clair de Lune" by Debussy as the vows were exchanged. Mrs. Bailey sang "The Lord's Prayer" for the benediction and the "Wedding March" by Mendelssohn was used for the recessional.

The bride entered the church with her father by whom she was given in marriage. She wore a pale length gown of French Chantilly lace and satin with a nylon tulle skirt made over satin. The lace jacket buttoned down the front with satin covered buttons and featured a mandarin neckline. Matching lace gauntlets that

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
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
