

### Holiday Shopping For Boys Overseas

The Defense Department has announced that Christmas packages for men overseas should be mailed before November 15th and has urged those sending gifts overseas to mail parcels early. It seems a bit premature, just as we are getting over summer, to speak of Christmas.

However, the Defense Department makes its recommendations on the basis of past experience, as tremendous distances are involved in sending a parcel from the United States to Japan or Korea. There are also over 100,000 Americans in Europe and even this number of parcels can easily cause a serious overloading of the mails if most of them are sent in a comparatively short period.

Thus, you are urged to get your Christmas shopping underway at the earliest convenient time, so that servicemen overseas will not be disappointed this Christmas. Mailing boxes should be of double-faced corrugated cardboard, or box of comparable strength, and tied with strong cord. The loose end flaps should be sealed with gummed tape, and the con-

### Reviews Work Of Highway Patrol

Raleigh—The State Highway Patrol made 12,274 arrests in August, inspected 123,709 drivers' licenses, issued 10,144 warning tickets and investigated 3,417 complaints.

Men of the patrol spent 146,418 hours on duty and traveled 1,885,868 miles in the discharge of their duties.

They inspected 27,348 vehicles and weighed 636 trucks of which 138 were overloaded.

Of the 12,274 arrests 11,165 were found guilty the patrol noted.

### New Ears For Old Provided By Surgery

Chicago.—New ears, fashioned around a piece of cartilage, shaped like a half moon, taken from a joint of the knee, were described by the International College of Surgeons. The knee cartilage is obtained from knees lost through amputations, or taken during surgery to fix "trick" knees and kept frozen until needed.

### Thousands Violate Laws Of Highway

Raleigh—Speeding convictions led the way again in September the Department of Motor Vehicles reported today. Last month 2,271 North Carolina motorists paid fines for exceeding the speed limit. Another 1,535 were convicted for driving with no operator's permit, and 1,448 suffered penalties for reckless driving.

Miscellaneous violations, which the Department reports regularly each month, are as follows: 854 faulty equipment (brakes, steering, etc.)

692 failing to stop for stop sign.

215 improper lights.

199 improper passing.

142 failing to yield right-of-way.

110 following too closely.

The total number of convictions came to 9,610. An additional 1,160 out-of-state motorists brought the grand total for September to 10,770 motorists found guilty of traffic violations on North Carolina highways.

### Hundreds Losing Drivers' License

Raleigh—The Department of Motor Vehicles revoked the driving privileges of 816 North Carolina motorists last month who were convicted of driving drunk.

The September score of drunk drivers is contained in the Department's monthly summary of violations requiring the surrender of drivers' licenses. Other convictions included:

44 for reckless driving.

31 for larceny of automobile.

28 for transporting liquor.

During September 148 motorists failed to maintain proper financial responsibility and thereby lost their operator's permit.

Another 21 were convicted in unsatisfied judgment cases and 12 were convicted as habitual violators.

The monthly total of revocations came to 1,228 and suspensions to 554.
