

Warns Democrats About Republican Party Slush Fund

National Party Chairman Urges Democrats To Work Hard

Stephen A. Mitchell, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, has warned Democratic Party workers that Republicans are trying "to buy victory" in a desperate attempt to win the 1952 election.

Mitchell's warning came in a telegram to national committee men and women and state chairmen and vice chairmen as evidence of the multi-million-dollar GOP last-minute desperation campaign continued to mount. "All reports to national headquarters indicate tide is running strongly to Stevenson and Sparkman," Mitchell said in his wire, "but we must redouble our efforts

in next two weeks to hold advantage.

"Republicans will spend millions in these two weeks to try to buy victory by saturating all media and by stepping up personal smear tactics used by Nixon, McCarthy, Dewey and others against Stevenson and Sparkman.

"Two-million-dollar radio-TV blitz hits in last two weeks of October. GOP has quarter of a million worth of billboard advertising.

"We don't have the funds to match this huge Republican outlay. We don't resort to smearing. This means that it is up to local speakers and precinct workers to fight the Republican slush fund and smear campaign with the truth about the Democratic record, with the truth about Governor Stevenson and Senator Sparkman."

The Republicans have purchased 6,500 large billboards throughout the nation at a cost of \$227,500.

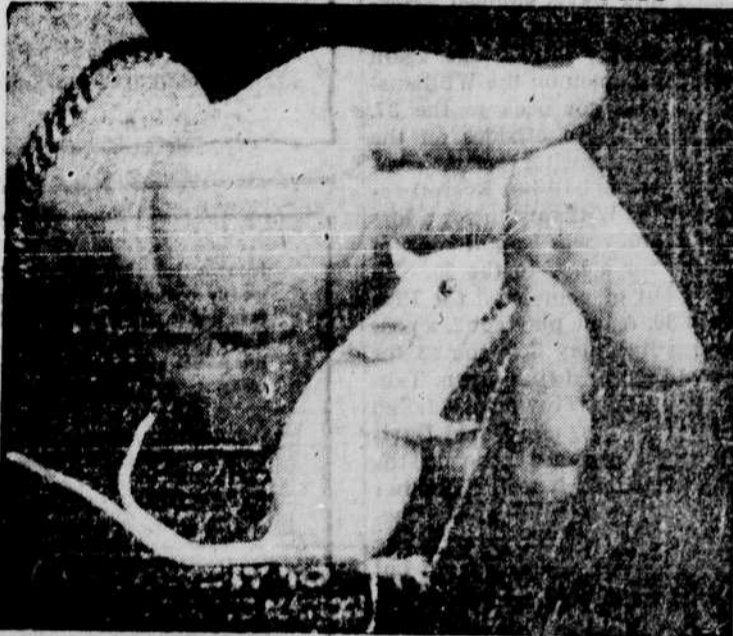

Science Studies Two-Tailed Mouse



PEARL RIVER, N. Y. — Not only political parties are split this year. Evidence of a division in the animal world is also apparent. But unlike the election year phenomenon, the split in this little mouse's tail is a very rare thing.

One of the world's largest breeders of mice for experimental work said that in his 22 years of raising 25,000 mice a week, he had never seen such a specimen. The double appendage saved this one's life, because she was to be used as a test animal here at Lederle Laboratories.

One scientist said that instead of injecting this mouse they would now attempt to mate her and get a batch of little "fork-tailers". He theorized that maybe they would be useful in research work that requires tail injections. "If you made a mistake on one," he said, "you could just try the other tail."

Interesting Bits Of Business In U. S.

There are more civilians on the federal payroll than the total population of the 13 American Colonies in 1776. . . . The Commerce Department reports personal income in the United States during the first eight months of this year was 5 per cent higher than in the same 1951 period. . . . Corporations have more money, too: their working capital was at a new high of \$85.7 billion at the end of June. . . . And—cash dividends publicly reported were \$5,764 million during the first three quarters of 1952—up 4 per cent over space has been bought up by the Republicans.
