Gamblers Remain Despite Imposing Of Federal Tax

Frank Lohn, chief of the internal Revenue Bureau's Intelligence Division, has declared that the law that was to force most gamblers to pay heavy taxes or put them out of business, which was one year-old on November 1, has done neither in its first year. The Government collected probably less than \$9,000,000 in taxes, compared with Congressional estimates of \$400,000,000 Instead of being forced out of business, gamblers "have just gone underground," according to Mr. Lohn. However, he added the law is a "deterrent to the gambling fraternity."


