

Blue mold was reported this week in the fields of Farmer Jesse Rawls in Bear Grass. but the warm weather is expected to check it. Blue mold has seldom been seen in the fields in this county. The damage was fairly extensive. Brandon said. Tobacco is "moving" now and farmers are "laying by" their corn.

The peanut crop is off to a poor start, most farmers reporting poor stands. The Williamston Peanut Company has supplied between 50,000 and 60,000 pounds of seed peanuts for replanting during the past ten days, it was said. Quite a few farmers plowed their fields and planted the crop a second time in its entirety while a majority resorted to replanting.
