Parrot Fever Is Increasing

On May 30 the Public Health Service in Washington announced that more persons have been afflicted with psittacosis, commonly called parrot fever, this year than in previous years. An official stated that parakeets bottled into this country in violation of regulations for quarantine may be responsible. A great many parakeets have been brought in without passing quarantine regulations. So far 123 cases of parrot fever have been reported in 1954 which is approximately the total figure for all of 1953. Formerly fatal, the disease is now supposed to be curable. Human beings catch it through infected birds. Besides parrots and parakeets, turkeys, pigeons and other kinds of birds may be carriers.

Navy Blimp Sets Endurance Test

A new navy blimp endurance record has been set, with the crew and aircraft remaining in the air for 200 hours without refueling, it was announced on May 24. This is of value in wartime for such an airship to be able to stay up for long periods of time without coming down to refuel. "The blimp could wait for a submarine to surface if it took all week," Lt. Albert Robertson, a Navy public relations officer from Key West, Florida, said, "and there are many other times when continuous flight without refueling could be a great tactical advantage." The new record was set near Miami when the dirigible exceeded the old record of 170.3 hours set in 1947 by an M-type airship. The aircraft had covered more than 3,000 miles and been under way all times on patrol over the Atlantic seaboard, the Caribbean, and the Gulf of Mexico.

The Senate Appropriations Committee approved a defense funds bill totaling \$28,861,000,000 after restoring to it \$177,000,000 cut by the House from the original White House request.
