Forty-eight cases have been placed on the criminal docket for trial when Judge Leo Carr of Burlington opens a two-week term of the Martin County Superior Court next Monday. While the cases are scheduled for trial during the first three days, it is fairly certain that the docket cannot be cleared before later in the
