Chapel Hill—An unusually large crowd of approximately 1,500 students heard Senator R. Reynolds defend his course in the United States Senate and his organization of the "American Vindicators" in a speech here before the Carolina Political Union.

Tobacco Prospects Hurt

Raleigh—Withdrawal of Great Britain from the American tobacco market is a "very serious blow" to prospects for North Carolina's chief cash crop, Dr. I. O. Schaub, N. C. State College dean of agriculture and director of the College extension service said. Dr. Schaub implored every farm family to grow something to eat this year, for their families and for their livestock.

Too Many Denominations

Greensboro—Dr. G. Ray Jordan of Winston-Salem told a fourth annual convocation of North Carolina Council of Churches here that "there is no justification for the more than 200 denominations in America, as there are not that many vital religious issues in the New Testament."

Killed by Falling Tree

Dunn—Wesley Barefoot, 62, farmer of Dunn, route 5, was injured fatally when a huge tree fell on him near his home. Barefoot had gone in the woods to show a lumber crew the dividing line of his property.

To Operate Orphanage

Lexington—The North Carolina State Council of the Junior Order voted unanimously at a special session here to take over the Junior Order Orphan's Home here from the national council and continue its operation.

Asks Drug Probe

Raleigh—Dr. Carl V. Reynolds, state health officer, demanded an investigation of the charge made before the general board of the Baptist State Convention that marijuana, sex stimulating drug, is used to a considerable extent by high school students in the state. The Rev. Mr. Adams told the Baptist board last week:

"The greatest menace to the schools of our state is marijuana and it is present in all the high schools I have visited."

Seek Air Line

Fayetteville—Representatives of Wilmington, Charlotte, Pinehurst, and Fayetteville met here to further plans for the establishment of an airline between Wilmington and Charlotte by way of Fayetteville and Pinehurst.

Counterfeiter Held

Salisbury—Joe Martin, charged with counterfeiting, was given a preliminary hearing before United States Commissioner Stoner W. Klutz and ordered held for trial in Salisbury federal court in April.

Dairymen Meet

Pinehurst—The North Carolina Dairy Products Association in their annual meeting here, heard Forest H. Shuford, North Carolina commissioner of labor, tell that industries prefer to locate in states which have gone forward in labor legislation.

Nude Rider Fined

Mt. Airy—N. B. Spainhour, 24, Surry County's "nude rider" was fined \$500 and costs in Surry County Superior Court on a charge of indecent exposure.

Open Historic House

Halifax—The national president-general of the Daughters of the American Revolution and other notables will attend the formal opening of the restored Constitution House here February 2. The house is the shrine wherein was written the first constitution of North Carolina.

Legacy For Orphanage
Windsor—Under the terms of a will filed with clerk of court here the sum of \$10,000 cash is to be given to the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., for construction of a dormitory at the Thomasville Baptist orphanage. The will was that of Dr. Wayland Mitchell of Lewiston. The anatomy department of Wake Forest College, his wife and nephew shared in the bequests.

Child Killed by Car
Smithfield—Jesse Mumford, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Mumford was killed when struck by a car shortly after he had got off a school bus near Bagley.

Double Execution
Raleigh—Central Prison Friday asphyxiated Glenn Maxwell of Alleghany County and Clarence Rog-

ers of Durham County, both Negroes, for confessed murders.

Chapel Hill—With the attendance reaching 215 to exceed expectations, the 16th annual Newspaper Institute came to a close here Saturday.

Named McNutt Manager

Charlotte—State Senator Joe L. Blythe has been named North Carolina manager for Paul V. McNutt, the federal security administrator, in his campaign for the presidency of the United States.

Hunter Shot Fatally

Fayetteville—J. W. Richardson, 19, was instantly killed by a discharge of a shotgun in the hands of Sim Canady, Jr., while the two were bird hunting.

Deane Announces

Raleigh—C. B. Deane of Rockingham, one of the two contenders in one of the bitterest and most prolonged election fights this state ever has seen, announced that he is again a candidate for Congress from the eighth district. Representative W. O. Burgin of Lexington, Deane's opponent in the 1938 fight, and Giles Y. Newton of Gibson have announced they will run.

Sues For False Arrest

Smithfield—The Raleigh branch of Charles Stores Company has been named defendant in two damage suits totaling \$30,000 brought by Buren Smith and G. Vernon Stancel for alleged false arrest last November 23. The suits were filed in Johnston superior court.

Plays "Pimp System"

Charlotte—Judge Frank Sims of Charlotte recorder's court in a speech before the Rotary Club on The Negro Problem averred that 95 per cent of the policing done in Charlotte has been done by agreements between officers and their stool pigeons. Prior to July he said the customary agreement between an officer and the pimp who informed him about another Negro's having liquor, was to split the liquor \$100 on the pimp's informant three ways — one third for the pimp, one third for the officer and one third for evidence.

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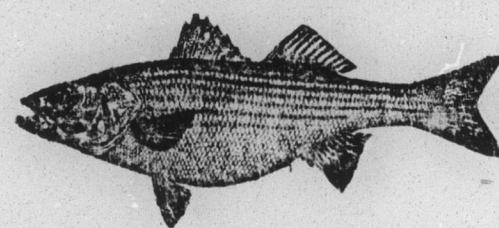
