

> Tuesday night, March 27, Dr. Eugene C. Pfaff, director of the Southern Council on International Relations and professor at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, spoke on "International Relations" at the courthouse, under the sponsorship of the Columbia Woman's Club and the Rotary Club, of Columbia, at which time the public was invited.

Mrs. G. M. Garrett, International Relations Chairman for the Columbia Weman's Club was in charge of the meeting and introduced the speaker. Dr. Pfaff aroused his hearers to their part in International affairs by describing our day as one of B-29's and B-32's, robot planes and rocket bombs. And "to save our own skins and to be able to sleep safely in our own beds," he said, we must become better informed and use our influence in regards to issues of today. that will determine tomorrow.

He likened the rebuilding of the World Federation of nations to the early history of the 13 colonies. Its development and success depend largely on our increased understandng and appreciation of our neighbors and our increased understanding and appreciation of our neighbors and our practice of the principles of Christian brotherhood.
