KILLING TIME

After months largely devoted to political maneuvering and campaign oratory, the Republican leaders in Congress are making plans for the adjournment of Congress early in June. It is said that efforts will be made now to speed up the annual appropriation bills and to bring about an adjournment sine die before the national conventions.

In the event an adjournment is taken as planned it must leave without action various legislative proposals of importance to the country. That the Democratic leaders in Congress will protest against an abrupt ending of the session, with these matters still hanging fire is probable.

The Republicans in control of Congress, however, are anxious to get in to their campaigns and will make every effort to end the session within the next seventy days. It is appreciated by them that this is the year in which they give an account of their stewardship and inasmuch as the record of the Republican Congress has not been satisfactory even to a large number of Republicans, all that time that can be obtained is desired for campaign purposes.

Regardless of the attitude of the two parties on a number of matters, and the division, to an extent, in the parties regarding such policies as soldier bonus legislation, the Republican leadership of Congress will face complaint that these issues have been permitted to hang fire month after month and that Congress has not proceeded in a business like way to dispose of them.

The House has just begun consideration in committee of soldier bonus bills. Months ago such bills were on the calendar, and even before that time the proposal of the then Secretary of the Interior, Franklin K. Lane, for land settlement legislation in behalf of the returned soldiers, were before Congress. Republican leaders of the House, however, refused to permit the Lane recommendations to be brought from their pigeon-hole, though Democrats like former Speaker Clark repeatedly asked when the G. O. P. steering committee intended to act.

Unless there is unusual haste in the House the bonus bill hearings that have been in progress before the Ways and Means committee cannot result in actual legislation before the time planned for the adjournment. So unsatisfactory has been the situation regarding a disposal one way or the other of the soldier bonus problem that a committee representing the American Legion served an ultimatum on Congress several weeks ago that it expected legislation within sixty days. The Legion proposed any one of the four plans for the aid of veterans of the World War.

The Republican Congress has failed to act on such pressing matters as the development of the merchant marine policy, modifications in the taxation laws and measures seeking to bring down the high cost of living.

Much of the time of the House has been consumed in so-called investigations of the war and other executive departments, while the Senate has wasted month after month with discussions of the treaty of peace. In consequence, the upper chamber is just getting to such legislation as the regular appropriation bills and will have little time for major legislation of a general scope. The House recently has made fair progress on the annual budgets, but has sidestepped action various legislative recommendations of the administration and executive departments. The bill for the return of the railroads to their owners was barely passed before the date actually set for the return and Congress has been behind on its work but well ahead in talk and campaign oratory since it convened nearly a
