became indignant. The Women's Club of Merchantville voted for a lockout and refuse to pay more than \$2.50 a day. So in face of the paper shortage, Merchantville has issued an emergency call for paper collars and cuffs and reversible paper shirt fronts.

\$45,000 IN PRIZES TO BE AWARDED AT HORSE SHOW

London, May 10.—(By Associated Press.)—Cash prizes totaling \$45,000 are to be awarded at the International Horse Show to be held in June at Olympia, London, the first to be held after a lapse of six years. TARBORO STEAM PRESSING CLUB SPECIAL ELECTION CALLED FOR MACCLESFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT Upon the petition of the County Board of Education presented this day to the Board of County Commissioners it is hereby ordered that a special election be held in the Macclesfield Special School district to ascertain the will of the people of the said district as to whether there shall be issued for the said district, bonds in the amount of \$25,000 for the purchase on the bonds to be six percent payable semi-annually and the length of time the bonds are to run shall be twenty years.

It is further ordered that the said election be held on Tuesday the eleventh day of May, 1920, with polling place at Macclesfield; that the registration for the said election be opened on Monday, April 19, 1920, and closed at sunset on Saturday, May 8, 1920; and that at said election those favoring the issuing of the said bonds shall vote a printed or written ballot containing the words "For Schoolhouse Bonds" and those opposed shall vote a like ballot containing the words "Against School House Bonds."

It is further ordered that J. W. Edwards be appointed registrar and A. B. Felton and J. T. Winstead be pose of building a public building and furnishing the same with suitable equipment, the amount of the special tax to pay the interest and to create a sinking fund to pay said bonds when due, shall be 20c on the one hundred dollar valuation of property and 60c on the poll; the in-appointed judges for the said special election.
