That the following rates and rules for current consumed shall be in effect from and after June 1st, 1920:  
Electric Light Rates.  
All bills payable first of each month at office of City Clerk.  
Flat rates:  
2 cents per watt connected load.  
Meter rates:  
15c per K. W. hour.  
Minimum charge of \$1.50 for 10 K. W. hours subject to 5 per cent

discount.  
10 to 24 K. W. hours at 15 cents; 5 per cent discount.  
25 to 99 K. W. hours at 15 cents; 10 per cent discount.  
100 to 199 K. W. hours at 15c; 15 per cent discount.  
200 to 399 K. W. hours at 15c; 20 per cent discount.  
400 K. W. hours and over at 15c; 25 per cent discount.  
No discount allowed on bills unless paid on or before the 10th of month. In case rent is not paid on or before the 15th of month, the superintendent shall have the current cut out of such premises until said rent is paid in full, and in addition a charge of \$2.00 for cutting out and turning on current.

**DECREASED PRODUCTION**  
Perhaps no institution in the country is in better shape to secure supplies than the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, and surely there is no national institute in better position to analyze our domestic conditions, since it reaches everywhere. In the opinion of the company, "the average falling off of the production throughout the country is estimated to be about 35 per cent, and this in spite of greatly increased prices." In its own principal purchase table of the percent of increase in costs from August 1914 to January 1920 shows that on more than half of the large number of articles the advance has been 100 per cent and upwards to as much as 475 per cent. The conspicuous feature of this story which is used as an illustration because it affects a concern in such general operation, apparently removes any doubt about there being any great backed-up demand for construction work in practically every line of industry.

"There is no reason of panic or industrial depression in the face of such a prospect," says an economic expert. Added to this important observation is the addenda of needed houses, railroad equipment and construction work that has long been on the waiting list. The needs of other countries are also of great importance, but foreign commerce is lagging, waiting for some signs of industry catching up with itself.  
The world has not gotten back to normal production and everywhere it is the same old story concerning retarded development and the lack of construction to meet the imperative needs.  
While the hours of labor have been reduced the wages have climbed steadily. It is pointed out that those who received early advantages with their pay checks lost the value of these increases as other advances followed. They now seek to recover the gains they have lost by further increases in wages. As a result wages are raised first in one quarter and then in another, each successful demand suggesting others. In the past history of the country, increased expenditures were a guarantee of increased production. One of the reasons why we do not get this today is the shorter hours. Was that the only reason, it might be overcome. Accepting the estimate of the Bell System that the decrease in production represents 85 per cent, the deficit cannot be squared up by charging it to the shorter day.  
Evidently there continues to exist country a good deal of unrest throughout the country, and to this unhealthy condition may be safely charged the responsibility of most of the "loafing on the job" that has cut down production.
