**LOCALS AGAIN BEAT
HYPHEN TOSSERS**

Victory Gives Locals Lead of
Game and Half Over Club
For First Half.

Yesterday afternoon at the fair grounds the local baseball team took the second straight game from the Scotland Neck-Hobgood aggregation by a score of 4 to 2, before one of the largest and most enthusiastic gatherings of baseball fans that has ever witnessed a game here. The victory gives the local team a one and one-half game lead over the other teams in the circuit and puts them in a good position to carry off the honors in the first half of the schedule, and Manager Shipley, having won five straight games, is confident his gang will increase their string of victories.

Manager Shipley introduced one Lefty Brisk, Tarboro's lengthy southpaw, to those hyphenated ball tossers and they immediately jumped on his offerings for a triple and double that, following an error, gave them two runs, but "Lefty" came back strong in the second frame and from then until the game was over he apparently had everything in the world and the best they could register on the scoreboard was a string of goose eggs. Only once after the first inning did they threaten to score, and this was in the ninth, when a couple of bobbles in the local infield after two were down put runners on second and third, but Third-baseman Kuyk skied to McArthur and ended the game.

Johnson was the pitching selection of the visiting team, and although losing he pitched a creditable game. Tarboro got a run off his delivery in the first when Lancaster strolled, went to third on a passed ball and scored when Bird singled to right. After this, however, the Burgaw High school pitcher prevented further scoring until the last half of the sixth, when the locals jumped on his delivery for two singles and a double, which, coupled with two costly errors, netted them three runs, enough to win the game. In the last two innings the locals got men on the paths but were unable to score.

Both teams fielded loosely, no less than ten errors being counted against the two teams. Six of them were made by local players, but they at times when they didn't do much damage, while the visitors' miscues were costly.
