There has never been a time when the women of the south have failed 2 in a single duty, nor will they in regard to registration when the matter is thoroughly explained to them. They did not want the suffrage, at least most of them did not, and now they feel as though they were treading on forbidden ground to attempt to assume the prerogative that recently was for man alone.

Yesterday a lady, who had no desire to vote, but realizing it her duty now that the law had given her the right, was very forceful in her desire for all other women to take the matter seriously and to do their duty by registering during this, the last week.

Suggesting that many are unaware of the importance of women exercising the right of suffrage this year, this lady desired The Southerner to request that committees be formed to call upon all the women in Tarboro, and vicinity, and acquaint them of the need for their registration and to register them in their homes without asking them to come to the pre-

Mr. Don Gilliam, chairman of the Edgecombe County Democratic Executive Committee, states that he has appointed such committees who have assured him they will call upon the women during the week with the registration books and be prepared to explain the situation to them.

This, then, covers the point of convenience and especially gives the women an opportunity of discussing the matter individually, which is, we have been assured, all that is needed for the women of Edgecombe county to fall in line and perform a duty that is earnestly urged.
