The Biggest Problem.

Out of the government appropriations for the current fiscal year, 93 per cent will go for war and paying the costs of past wars. Meanwhile this nation is spending only one per cent of its appropriations for education, development, and research into better methods.

A business that spent 93 per cent of its money in fighting its competitors, and one per cent in developing its own activities, would be considered to be the work of insane minds.

That with the world on the verge of fighting, it may not be possible to drop a dollar of preparation for war at this time. But if the human race continues spending its substance in plans for killing each other, it fairly deserves to be exterminated off the planet.

So the one big problem overtopping all others, is that of finding some means of preserving peace. War places on the backs of struggling humanity an impossible burden.

Women and Boss Rule.

The leaders who finally put over the woman suffrage movement to nation wide success, are emphasizing the idea that their sex is much more independent of "boss rule" than the men ever were. If so, the community will be the gainer, but it is often difficult to define just what boss rule really is.

It is not easy to distinguish a "boss" from a "leader." People who do not grasp political questions, naturally look to the

wiser heads for guidance, and they often make mistakes in their choice.

As a result of too much readiness to accept suggestion, the great political machines and rings have grown up. Some merely trade offices, but would not stoop far enough to deal in graft or bribes. Others have no scruples whatever. But all of them seem able, by wheedling arts, to persuade many voters that they are acting for the good of the masses of the people.

It is only by general intelligence that the power of corrupt or selfish bosses can be broken. The people who read the newspapers carefully are not driven around much. They are influenced to a certain extent by the views of trusted leaders, but at least they have the sense to pick out guides who have made records of genuine public service.

Women will do a lot of quiet thinking in the seclusion of the home, and may be inclined to follow less in droves than men. If they make it their practice to read and think about the issues of the day, they will be a great help in defeating machine rule. But those who merely vote as some one suggests, or who act on sudden impulse, will accomplish nothing more than to exchange one boss for another.
