THE SOCIAL LIFE OF
TARBORO.

The development of a city is
no dependent on business con-
ditions alone. Sentiment plays
a big part. If people get at-
tached to a town, if they make
warm friends, they are very
slow to leave it. It will take a
much bigger opportunity in
work and business to tempt
them away.

On the other hand, if a town
is cold and formal, if there is
no neighborly and friendly spir-
it, people feel lonely and rest-
less and want to go elsewhere
where there is more doing.

How far have we been able
to cultivate the spirit of friend-
ship in Tarboro? Do we make
newcomers feel at home?

What can be done so that
the whole community shall be
bound together with ties of
common interest and cordial
personal relations? The Sou-
therner is going to try to an-
swer these questions in a series
of editorials soon to be pub-
lished. The development of
our city can be greatly pro-
moted by the growth and en-
couragement of this spirit of
community neighborliness.

THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK

What are the business pros-
pects for the fall and winter?
Will there be only a gradual
recovery from the recent dull

the verge of a big business ex-
pansion, as many competent
authorities believe?

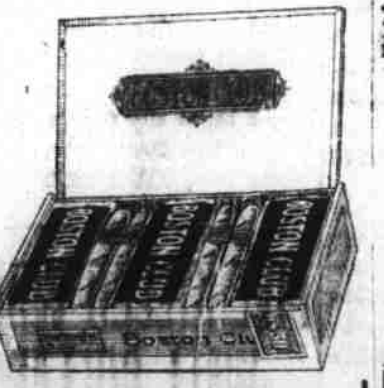
