WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Subcommittees reconvened today preparatory to the meeting of the full unemployment conference tomorrow. The committees are prepared to consider recommendations for a program of permanent measures to combat unemployment and hasten the return of normalcy in industry and commerce.

PUPILS HEAR MR. LAPSLEY

Rev. R. A. Lapsley, jr., was the speaker at the city school chapel exercises this morning. He selected "Obedience" for his subject and based his talk on the scriptural account of Paul's unflinching adherence to this duty. Mr. Lapsley told the pupils that they could not learn a more valuable lesson than that of obedience. He made his point clear and emphatic by several striking illustrations from history. The Duke of Wellington's high regard for this virtue was graphically portrayed in a story and the Charge of the Light Brigade was given as the highest example of unquestioning obedience. The heroic Havelock was quoted as saying with his last breath that the greatest lesson he ever learned was that of obeying orders.

"Learn to obey your parents, your teachers, your government, and your God," declared Mr. Lapsley, "and you will have mastered the supreme lesson and become qualified to command others."
