HARDING OPPOSED TO ONE MAN RULE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—President Harding has approved the house ways and means committee's flat rejection of Secretary of the Treasury Mellon's insistent demand that he be given absolute power to refund this government's \$11,000,000,000 war loans to the allies.

The president's attitude was expressed to Representative Mondell, Republican leader in the house. Mr. Mondell explained that intense opposition in the house to the granting of such tremendous power to one

man had made it impossible to put thru the administration bill in its original form.
