The following clipping from the Rocky Mount Telegram hits the nail on the head. The editor is exactly right and his view of keeping up a tobacco market is correct, whether it applies to Rocky Mount or Tarboro:

The idea that the tobacco market was a business to be run by the warehousemen alone, and that only those planters would be brought here that they could urge to come here, is rather the wrong idea, or at any rate our neighbors are not permitting it to rest there for they are fighting. The matter of preference for any warehouse should be secondary and even remote for that matter for the great big need is to get the sales made on this market.

Let any tobacco interest in any town go down and the town looks like a cemetery. And on the other hand let the people and business men neglect the local markets and place all the responsibility of maintaining it upon the warehousemen and the buyers, and you will see the market slack and finally drop out of the game.

It is about time for Tarboro to start again an extra boost and have things moving. Our neighboring towns are getting on the job now for this season and the next year. Let us all get busy.

BURLINGHAM STABBING NOT WORK OF COMMUNISTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Both the American and Mexican governments are investigating the stabbing of Lloyd Burlingham, American consul at Salina Cruz, Present indications are that there is no connection between the assault and the Communist activities against American diplomatic officials in Europe. The general belief here is that the incident was the outgrowth of the sporadic outbreaks of banditry reported from that region of Mexico.

State department officials understand that Burlingham has resigned, but his resignation has not yet been received. His injuries were reported as not at all serious and Albert Pani the Mexican foreign minister, has tendered his personal apologies.

SNOW HILL, Oct. 26.—The trial of Mrs. Sarah Whitley, charged with first degree murder in connection with killing of her husband by Write Rouse, a negro, abruptly ended today, when the defense pleaded guilty

of accessory before the fact and accepted a life sentence. Rouse was sentenced to be electrocuted January 2.

NATION WIDE BOMB BY RADICALS, IS REPORTED

BOSTON, Oct. 28.—Federal agents say they have unearthed in Boston plans of an organized gang of radicals to spread a reign of terror over the whole United States next Saturday, Sunday and Monday. The plot, according to the investigators, was to have been carried out by radicals who hoped to aid the cause of Sacco and Vanzetti, awaiting sentence here for murder.

The conspirators planned to dynamite buildings all over the country, and especially buildings housing department of justice offices. Precautionary measures were taken here and warnings have been sent to local authorities of threatened cities all over the United States.

CENTRAL AMERICA SENDS ENVOYS OF NEW REPUBLIC

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Three commissioners from the new Republic of Central America, which is being set up out of the republics of Guatemala, Honduras and Salvador, are on the way to Washington to present to Secretary Hughes their statement of the constitution and organization of the new nation.

Elections will take place in the republic of Central America next Sunday and the congress then chosen will hold its first meeting on Jan. 25. The provisional federal council named political administration on October 4.

HAYWOOD WILL NOT RETURN, WOBBLI PAYS BONDSMEN

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—That William D. "Big Bill" Haywood, former I. W. W. chief, does not intend to come back to America from Russia was given himself up to the federal authorities was taken for granted when it became known that the wobbly organization was collecting \$65,000 from its membership to reimburse the bondsmen of Haywood and nine others.

Henry Feinberg, secretary of the defense committee, stated that the money would be raised from among 25,000 members by assessment and donations. He thought it would take a year or more to raise the money.
