MACK'S PARTY HERE CHOIR PRACTICE TONIGHT

With practically all members of his party in town, the stage is set for the opening here Sunday morning of Cyclone Mack's revival campaign. The first choir practice under the direction of John H. Jones will be held at the Methodist church tonight at seven-thirty.

Mack's man of many parts, Fred Seibert, has been here several days, as has Mrs. Seibert. Director Jones arrived Thursday and today will see the arrival of Mrs. Vena Goode, pianist with the McLendon party, who is said to have few superiors in her work. Miss Sara C. Palmer, Bible teacher of the party, will arrive some time tomorrow and Mr. McLendon will also get in Saturday.

It was at first planned to hold the first choir practice at the tent, but inability to get a piano placed Thursday night prevented this and arrangements were made yesterday for the first practice tonight.

Interest in Tarboro and the country roundabout is keen in the coming of Mack. Indications are that delegations from Scotland Neck, Williamston, Greenville, Washington and Rocky Mount will be over to hear the famous evangelist during his first week.
