HOW ABOUT IT, TARBORO FOLKS?

The Washington Chamber of Commerce met a few days ago and gave their unqualified indorsement to the farmers of Beaufort in their attempt to improve their marketing condition by organizing a cooperative marketing association in that county.

This movement in Washington and Beaufort county has received the sympathy and support of the best men.

In Goldsboro practically the same thing was done last week. The leading business and professional men of that city gave words of cheer to the farmers of Wayne county and promised them their support and indorsement.

Similar action on the part of the many towns in the east has been taken recently and it shows to the outside world that the town folks are willing to back the producers in their honest efforts to improve their conditions on the farms.

The question has often been asked The Southerner how do the Tarboro people generally stand on the cooperative marketing system and what is their attitude of the business men here towards this system.

The Southerner believes that there is little or no opposition to the cooperative marketing plan among our people, but as yet nothing tangible has been done towards any particular assistance being given to this system.

The Southerner believes that the town of Tarboro now has an opportunity that is golden and should be taken advantage of at once.

If Tarboro people will take it upon themselves to go out in the rural sections and let it be known that our people are with the farmers and will stand by them thru thick and thin and show them by deeds as well as by words that we are their friends in their fight for cooperative marketing of their produce, it will be the biggest week's work that Tarboro has ever done for herself or our county.

And this is going to be done because there are men in town who see this golden opportunity and are going to take time by the forelock.

The North Carolina officials may not be able to get their hands on one Matthew Bullock, but the Ku Klux Klan are keeping him on the move. Bullock has no fear of North Carolinians, but the mention of the Ku Klux Klan makes him shiver in his boots.

The bill before the House of Commons in England to abolish all private ownership in real estate has about as much chance to pass into a law as a haunt has to get to heaven. The scheme is to put the title to all realty and farm lands into the newly-created ministry of land. Compensation to owners is to be paid in the form of five per cent national land stock, redeemable at par after thirty years.

WHAT A FEW HUSTLERS FOR A TOWN CAN DO.

The rain caused much disappointment all over the county in forcing the postponement of the County

Commencement, the Southerner has been struck most forcibly what a few hustling men in a town can do when they make up their minds.
