## DRAIN CONGRESS IN ANNUAL MEET

The 12th Annual North Carolina Drainage Convention, which opens at Goldsboro on Friday of this week under the auspices of the N. C. Drainage Association and the N. C. Geological and Economic Survey, bids fair to being the most interesting and instructive meeting of its kind ever held in the South. A program has been arranged which will bring a large attendance not only from the various parts of North Carolina, but from Virginia, South Carolina and Georgia.

At the Friday morning session the general subject will be "North Carolina's Black Soil Lands; Their Reclamation and Utilization." Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt, President of the North Carolina Agricultural Society, will make an address on Their Agricultural Value; Hon. S. H. McCrory of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture will discuss Their Timber Value; and Hon. Hugh MacRae of Wilmington N. C. will discuss Their Development and Settlement.

"The State's Interest in Reclamation" will be taken up at the Friday afternoon session, and the following points will be discussed: What the University can do to aid in Reclamation Work, by Prof. G. M. Braune Head of the Dept. of Engineering; The State College of Agriculture and Engineering, Prof. M. E. Sherwin of the State College; The State Dept. of Agriculture, Comm'r. M. A. Graham; The State Board of Health, Dr. H. A. Taylor, Hon. Mark W. Potter, member of the Interstate Commerce Commission, will discuss the question from the National Standpoint.

A special meeting of County Agricultural Agents will be held during the Friday afternoon session to discuss the general subject of the drainage of North Carolina Lands. Dr. B. W. Kilgore, Director of the State Experiment Station, will make an address and discussions will be led by Messrs. Geo. R. Boyd and F. O. Bartel, drainage engineers of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

On Friday night there will be an illustrated lecture on reclamation by

Service. A splendid moving picture film has been secured for this lecture.

On Saturday morning the big feature of the program comes, when "A National Reclamation Policy and the Settlement of Idle Lands" will be discussed, with addresses by Senator W. E. Borah of Idaho and Congressman W. B. Bankfield of Ala. Discussions will follow led by Hon. Clement S. Ucker, Director of Development of the S. A. L. Railway and member of the Federal Board of Indian Affairs; representatives from various industrial and development organizations from Virginia, South Carolina and Georgia; and Hon. W. A. McGirt of the North Carolina Landowners Association.

Saturday afternoon "The Duties of Sheriffs, Clerks of Court, Drainage Engineers and Commissioners under the North Carolina Drainage Law" will be the general subject. Hon. Frank Nash, assistant attorney general of the state, will discuss various points of the Drainage Law in connection; and this will be followed by a round table discussion by sheriffs, clerks of court and drainage engineers and commissioners present.

### TO LOCATE TOBACCO STATIONS IN NASH COUNTY

Dr. Joyner and Mr. Patterson of Richmond, Va., will be in Nashville next Friday to locate the tobacco stations for the farmers of Nash county. While there are no warehouses or drying plants in Nashville at the present time, this wide-awake town has told the Tobacco Cooperative Marketing Association that if Nashville is made a receiving station all the necessary equipments will be placed in the town as soon as possible. A big crowd of farmers is expected at Nashville Friday to hear Dr. Joyner and Mr. Patterson.
