**DIAMOND JUBILEE EARLHAM COLLEGE**

RICHMOND, IND., JUNE 3--Known as the "Quaker City of the West," Richmond will justify its title in the next three months when thousands of Friends from all parts of the United States meet here to participate in the diamond jubilee of Earlham college and to attend four important conferences.

The seventy-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Quaker college in this city will be conducted June 3 to 7, and the principal speaker on Commemoration Day, June 6, will be Herbert C. Hoopes, secretary of commerce, himself a Quaker. The growth of the institution from a Friends' Boarding School, which opened its doors June 7, 1847, will be depicted in a pageant on June 5.

The thirteenth annual general conference of young Friends is to be held at Earlham College, July 21 to 31.

Indiana Yearly Meeting, the largest organized body of Quakers in the world, will meet for its 102 annual conference August 8 to 14. This meeting and Western Yearly Meeting control Earlham College.

The biennial session of the Friends General Conference, the Hicksite Friends and the older branch are not organically united, they have participated in a number of movements, notable the distribution of relief in the war-stricken countries of Europe. Many Congregations of the Hicksite branch are in the eastern states and will be represented by delegates.

The five years' Meeting of Friends, composed of thirteen yearly meetings will meet here from September 5 to 12, with official representatives from the following yearly meetings: Canada, New England, New York, Baltimore, North Carolina, Wilmington, Indiana, Western, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Oregon and California.

The foreign and home mission work of the affiliated yearly meeting is directed by this organization, which meets once in five years.

**NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION IN THE CONSOLIDATED MACCLESFIELD HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT TO AUTHORIZE THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS OF SAID DISTRICT FOR SCHOOLHOUSES AND ORDER OF NEW REGISTRATION OF THE VOTERS OF SAID DISTRICT FOR SUCH SPECIAL ELECTION.**

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the Consolidated Macclesfield High School District of Edgecombe County North Carolina, on the 6th day of June, 1922, at the regular polling place in said District, under the authority contained in Article 39 of Chapter 95 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, and acts of the General Assembly of North Carolina amendatory thereof, to ascertain whether the voters of said School District are in favor of issuing bonds for the purpose of building, rebuilding and repairing a schoolhouse or schoolhouses in said District and furnishing the same with suitable equipment.

1. That the amount of bonds to be issued thereunder not to exceed the amount of Twenty five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00)

2. That said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed six percent annum, payable semi-annually.

3. That said bonds shall be in denomination of One Thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars each, and shall mature serially as follows: One each year from the 6th to 40th year, inclusive, from date of issue; and two each year from the 11th to 20th year, inclusive, from date of issue of said bonds.

4. That the maximum tax which may be levied and collected each year to pay the interest and principal of said bonds shall not exceed twenty five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of all taxable property in said district, and seventy five cents on each taxable poll in said district.

At said election those favoring the issuance of said bonds and the levying of a special tax therefor, shall vote ballots in which shall be printed the words "For Schoolhouse Bonds", and those who are opposed shall vote a ballot on which shall be printed the words "Against Schoolhouse Bonds". And if a majority of the qualified voter shall vote "For Schoolhouse Bonds", then it shall be the duty of the Board of County Commissioners to issue said bonds, not exceeding the amount specified, and shall thereupon annually levy a sufficient tax, not exceeding the amount specified, to pay the interest and principal of said bonds so issued, as said interest and principal may fall due.

And it is further ordered that said election be held and conducted in the same manner, and at the regular polling place in said District, as now prescribed for holding general elections, and there shall be a new registration of electors in said District for said election.

The Registrar, between the hours of nine o'clock A.M. and sunset, on each day (Sunday excepted) for twenty days preceding the day for closing the registration books will keep open said books for the registration of any electors residing within said School District and entitled to registration. The said books will be closed for registration at sunset on the 2nd Saturday before said election. On each Saturday during the period of registration the registrar shall attend with his registration book at the polling place in said District for the registration of voters.

The following Registrar and Judges of Election are hereby appointed for said election.
