POLISH REPUBLIC BEGINS UNIFICATION OF ARMAMENT

WARSAW, June 3.—The Polish republic has begun the unification of its armament, which, it has been found, will involve the scrapping of the bulk of the material accumulated from various sources during the past four years. The renewed equipment will be one more step in the transformation of the Polish emergency force to a methodically organized national body. Purchases are being made principally in France to replace that part of the old material that cannot be used for the equipment of the new army which, on a peace basis, was fixed at 250,000 men in the last budget. French officers are helping in the reorganization of the army, but in much smaller numbers than served during the campaign against the bolsheviks. There were then 1,986 of the French officers in the field; there are now 63, all told, attached to the army as instructors in the Polish military school.

HORSE RACING RESUMED IN MOSCOW AFTER FIVE YEARS

MOSCOW, June 2.—For the first time in five years, horse racing has been resumed in Moscow. The opening meet was attended by a huge crowd despite the entrance fee being 1,000,000 rubles. The women present were clothed in the latest fashions, and the new bourgeoisie rivalled the Soviet aristocrats in the art of spending money. Much business was done at the tombolator, bets being transacted in almost astronomical figures.

LE CREUSOT, France, June 2.

A group of American bankers, now visiting this part of the department of Saone-et-Loire, were shown over the celebrated local iron and steel works by Charles Schneider, the director of the enterprise. The visitors were astonished at the successful transformation of the various plants from a war to a peace basis. The section devoted to the making of heavy artillery during the war is now turning out daily 35 locomotives, and the factories which net long ago produced light artillery are today making turbine engines. A total of 28,000 workmen is employed in the Le Creusot works.
