BRITAIN MAKING RECORD IN COAL PRODUCTION

LONDON, June 3 .- While America is experiencing a coal strike, Great Britain is making records in coal production.

For the week ended April 29 Great Britain's coal output, according to the Board of Trade Journal, was 5,-160,000 tons, the largest output in any week since the end of the British sage to the Sunday school at 10 a.m. coal strike in July. Coal prices range between 30 and 60 shillings a ton, according to the grade. Best coal is two shillings a hundredweight delivered. There have been two reductions of two shillings six pence a ton during the last few weeks.
