#### BRITAIN MAKING RECORD IN COAL PRODUCTION

LONDON, June 3.—While America is experiencing a coal strike, Great Britain is making records in coal production.

For the week ended April 29 Great Britain's coal output, according to the Board of Trade Journal, was 5,160,000 tons, the largest output in any week since the end of the British coal strike in July. Coal prices range between 30 and 60 shillings a ton, according to the grade. Best coal is two shillings a hundredweight delivered. There have been two reductions of two shillings six pence a ton during the last few weeks.

#### Save Lives And Kill Moths By Sending Cast-off Clothing To Near East Relief

Make your cast-off winter clothes pay a dividend in human lives and help exterminate the moth colony in North Carolina. Clean out your old clothes closets and attics and send them to the Near East Relief to save lives the coming winter.

The foregoing appeal was made to all Tar heels this week from Raleigh by Col. George H. Bellamy, state chairman of that great humanitarian organization which is trying to save the Armenian race from extinction following their desertion by the Allies after they had played a material part in shortening and winning the war.

Every man, woman and child in North Carolina is asked to give at least one garment. For every complete outfit sent the life of one sufferer from Turkish massacres and the Great War will be saved next winter. Many were found during the cold months last year who had fringed themselves for miles suffering from acute rheumatism and pneumonia simply from lack of clothing.

All warm clothing that is wearable is acceptable. Clothing should be sent to your Near East Relief county chairman, or to the Near East Relief Clothing Warehouse, Old Southern Railway, Freight Shed, Raleigh, with the name and address of the giver marked on the package. June 1st is "Bundle Day" in North Carolina and Col. Bellamy asks that clothing be sent in no later than that day.

The North Carolina committee, of which Josephus Daniels is honorary state chairman, is especially desirous of obtaining as many as it can of coats, sweaters, dresses, wool shirts, blankets, heavy overcoats, wool gloves, mittens, boots and shoes (should be tied in pairs), sheets (for bandages), new clot or bandages and any warm heavy clothing in which there is still some wear.

Articles which cannot be used by the Near East Relief are: laces, silk, velvets, chiffons, evening clothes, satin slippers, muslin underwear, high seeded shoes, straw or frame hats or silk stockings. If anyone has any of these articles to give away it is suggested that a community sale or auction be held and the proceeds sent to Robert A. Brown, state treasurer, Near East Relief, Raleigh.
