A MANUFACTURER'S VIEWS ON COTTON.

In discussing the matter from the standpoint of the grower, the editor of the Manufacturer's Record says: "Probably no other industry so entirely ignores the question of its supply of raw material as the cotton industry. It goes further than this in apparently doing everything to curtail its raw material by beating down the price of cotton to below the actual cost of production. The industry today is facing a serious situation through the reduced acreage in cotton and the ravages of the boll weevil and pink boll worm which made the last crop the smallest in many years. It has been saved thus far by the carry-over of last year and reduced consumption."

In a paper recently published by Sir Charles W. Macrae, one of the leading British cotton manufacturers and a world authority on the cotton industry, the author says: "I have never ceased to put before the spinners of the world the absolute necessity of seeing that a price is paid to the grower of cotton that will remunerate him for his labor and enterprise."

"It is amazing that the planter is so little regarded, seeing that he is the basis of everything. If cotton could not be got, then none of us would be wanted. What I have always contended in the numerous articles and books I have published out of an unrivaled experience of the cotton trade all over the world, is that we must regard cotton production and manufacture as one whole industry, and that we should always put in the forefront the proper remuneration of the cotton planter. The planter, of course, should be encouraged to avail himself of all modern appliances, scientific methods and inventions, and to cultivate his land economically and to the greatest advantage, but when he has done this his enterprise should be fully acknowledged and appreciated. Especially should consideration be given at a time like the present, when the work of the planter is not only costly but surrounded by extraordinary difficulty."

This frank statement by one of Europe's greatest cotton manufacturers and regarded as one of the world's greatest textile authorities, that the spirit of England's cotton manufacturers has been to get cotton at the lowest cost even at "the ruin of the

growers" is only in accordance with what the Manufacturers Record has repeatedly printed. It is exactly the same spirit that has prevailed among European cotton buyers for three-quarters of a century. It is an accursed spirit which if they got their just punishment would doom every advocate of that policy to a life of poverty and misery such as they have tried to force upon all cotton growers in America and elsewhere.
