THAT CAMP GROUND FOR THE TARBORO PEOPLE.

Since the Boys Scouts have returned from Pamlico Beach down below the town of Washington and told about the great times they had while on their camp at this place the Southerner is more firmly convinced than ever before of the great necessity of having just such a camp ground for our people near Tarboro.

The time has come when all towns of any size or importance must have just such places for recreation and recreation is as of much importance to the town and city people as is the ordinary daily work.

As things are now when a man quits his work for the day he has not a single place to go unless it is the movies. But the clerk or the business man who has been confined all day in an office does not want to sit the balance of the night in a house. He wants to get out in the fresh air, where he can come close to nature, but in Tarboro there is no such place.

The Kiwanis Club some time ago discussed this matter of building a camp ground, but that seems to be about all. The site has been procured and several thousand feet of lumber have been secured but it is impossible to do much this year as the roads to the present camp site have been closed.

This camp site is needed for the Tarboro people and Mr. Hale, who has returned from the Pamlico Beach near Washington says he has some good suggestions to offer before the grounds are fitted up permanently.

The Southerner proposes to keep this matter before our people until next year, when it is to be hoped this ground will be secured and fitted up for the folks where they can go and enjoy themselves.

The following letter from Mr. Hale should be read with interest by all our people. He gives some interesting information about Camp Leach and his suggestions are well timed:

As the Scoutmaster of the troop of boys who went to Camp Leach last week I should like to take advantage of the generosity of your columns to state a few facts which might be of general interest to the people of Tarboro at this time in as much as there is a proposal to erect some kind of a camp nearby for young people.

Camp Leach is situated 12 miles from Washington, N. C., on 8 acres of land donated by the Eureka Lumber Co. of which the late Captain George Leach was president and general manager. In fact it largely due to him that there is a Camp Leach today. By public subscription the people of Washington raised nearly \$2,000 with which to build the camp.


The camp consists of two large clean, sunny, well screened barracks on either side of a commodious two-story lodge. Back of the lodge is a building containing a dining room and kitchen near which is a store which also stores ice. There is a very good beach with gradual slope for bathing and a boat for diving. The situation is ideal, the buildings up to date and complete in every way, there is a big well diamond. In fact the whole camp is splendidly equipped and excellent for the young people to have wholesome outdoor sports and life.

To this camp the Tarboro southerner is invited and given the exclusive use for eight days by the people of Washington for the nominal sum of \$5. Too much cannot be said for the general way in which the people of Washington received us and helped to make our stay a pleasant one. Mr. Oscar Hartley, the general secretary of the Community Y. M. C. A., made an arrangement for our boys and numerous boys are listed in the most helpful and friendly manner. Washington is to be congratulated in having such a man devoting all his time to work of this kind.

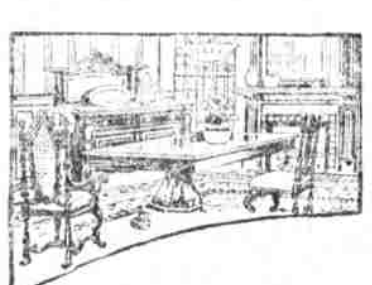
